Message from Mrs Reid



Dear Parents and Carers,

It looks like we've had the full range of extreme weather possible thrown at us this year, but there are still a few weeks to go, so I'm wary of speaking too soon. Many thanks for making accommodations last week for the hot weather. It wasn't easy, but no one suffered too badly.

Since half-term, our class structure has slightly altered, and routines and logistics are settling into place very smoothly. This is an excellent transition for the new year in September, meaning that children will be ready to return to procedures and expectations that will already be familiar to them.

At the start of this half-term, we all visited Plymouth and the Synagogue and Mosque. These were wonderful opportunities to learn more about significant world faiths, and to understand how people in Britain and across the world might worship and celebrate. The children represented our school superbly, showing respect at all moments. They also had a chance to walk a fair distance through the middle of Plymouth, with Mrs Cruise providing rolling road closures as we manoeuvred!

Our final Open the Book Assembly was held in the Village Hall, with our visitor bringing the story of the first Passover to life with theatrics and pupil participation. It was excellent timing, occurring just after our Plymouth visit to the places of faith.

This week, I took those Y4/5 pupils who are going on the Bristol Residential over to Lifton Community Academy to meet their fellow travelling companions. The children spent the afternoon learning more about the trip, and carrying out an interactive challenge together. I also spent time going over logistics with Mr Hill and Mr Legg, who are also leading the trip alongside.

At the end of this term and school year, Mrs Abbott will be retiring. She has worked at Coads Green, supporting hundreds of children and families for 18 years, and working tirelessly for the good of pupils, their learning, and the School. I hope she has the send-off she deserves, and a wonderful and restful retirement.

There is a lot going on over the remaining weeks of term, as detailed in the calendar dates below. We hope to hold the postponed Sports Day on 7th July.

Teachers will be in touch with you if your child needs a review for their IEP/Provision Map before the end of term.

LEARN ALL ABOUT PANTS WITH PANTOSAURUS!

P RIVATES ARE PRIVATE

Your underwear covers up your private parts and no one should ask to see or touch them. Sometimes a doctor, nurse or family members might have to. But they should always explain why, and ask you if it's OK first. Remember, what's in your pants belongs only to you.

A LWAYS REMEMBER YOUR BODY BELONGS TO YOU

Your body is yours, and no one should touch your private parts or any other parts of your body that you don't want to be touched. No one has the right to make you do anything that makes you feel uncomfortable. If somebody does make you do something, it's never your fault. Even if the person who has made you feel uncomfortable has told you it is your fault.

N O MEANS NO

You always have the right to say 'no' – even to a family member or someone you love. You're in control of your body and the most important thing is how YOU feel. If you want to say 'No', it's your choice.

S PEAK UP, SOMEONE CAN HELP

Talk about stuff that makes you worried or upset. If you ever feel sad, anxious or frightened you should talk to a safe adult who you trust.

This doesn't have to be a family member. It can also be a teacher or a friend's parent – or even Childline. Talking shouldn't get you into trouble, even if somebody has told you it will. If something has happened that makes you feel uncomfortable, it is never your fault.

T ALK ABOUT SECRETS THAT UPSET YOU

There are good and bad secrets. Good secrets can be things like surprise parties or presents for other people. Bad secrets make you feel sad, worried or frightened. You should always talk to a safe adult who you trust about a bad secret or anything that doesn't feel right.

Around the Classes



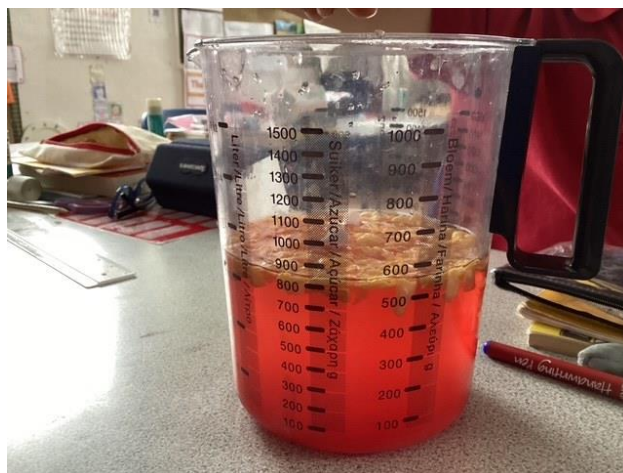
Class 1 and Class 3 (to be renamed for the new school year in September!) have been working apace. Class 1 is developing its outdoor learning, with countless opportunities for this. The children's writing is progressing strongly, with phonics learning and Drawing Club writing ensuring pupils have the tools they need to write well. Maths learning has centred around money most recently, with very attractive shopping opportunities on offer in the class shop.

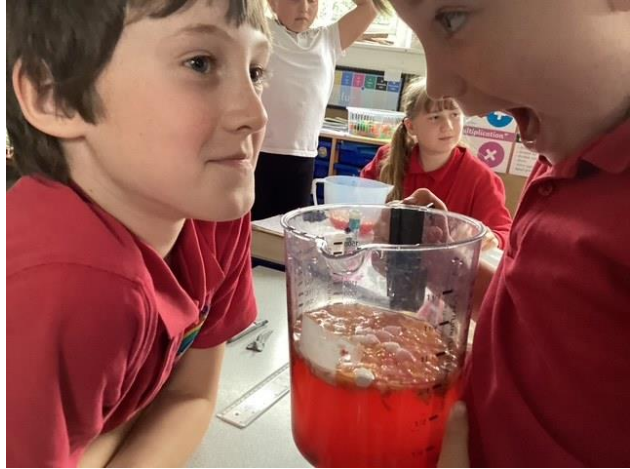
Incredible rocket construction and learning about space have been taking place in Class 1, inspired by their History topic on the 1960s.

Class 3 has been using our text "Small in the City" to develop writing about place, giving opportunities to use expanded noun phrases, adverbials and patterns of three. Maths has seen Y3/4 working on decimals, and Y5/6 on algebra. Both of these has seen a good level of understanding, and the chance for extension and support where needed.

We've carried out in depth learning about the Icelandic island of Hiemaey in Geography, and the attractions of living next to an active volcano, as well as the adaptations needed to do so.

In Science, Mrs D has been working on the human body, especially the functions of the heart and constituents of blood, in a slightly unpalatable illustrative experiment.
